In this our final newsletter for Term One, we take time to reflect on a time of triumph,challenge and mystery. We celebrate the many achievements of our talented students and the dedication and expertise of the Marian College staff who so ably support and guide them. In times of flux, I find the works of Rumi grounding and of comfort:

As Term One draws to a close, it is important for us to reflect on our recent learnings and achievements. The College's Key Priorities guide us in our journey, and I offer a small number of examples as high-water marks below:

- In its commitment to improving literacy levels across the College, school improvement leaders (SIGS) and learning leaders (LL) turned their focus within Hubs to developing literacy through reading. Professional learning teams comprised of all teaching staff have engaged in targeted, school-based professional learning throughout term One. Both Paul McLoughlan and Megan Shea (PEAT leaders) also commenced their involvement in the ILSY program, whilst Natalie Wirper has been instrumental in progressing the whole school implementation vision alongside me.
- In its commitment to strengthening and extending intervention processes to address student performance gaps and opportunity gaps, Marian College's Student Welfare team is doing exceptional work

through programs such as RELATE, Elevate Study Skills, Peer Support programs, and House activities to name but a few initiatives. In the Learning and Teaching space, opportunities for students to engage in innovative and contextualised learning opportunities are being seeded. One notable example is Marian College's recent invitation to enter into the highly competitive Partner Schools Program with the ARC Centre of Excellence for Dark Matter Particle Physics. https://www. centredarkmatter.org/ As a partner school, our students will have the opportunity to engage with experts in the physics discipline via incursions and webinars; whilst their science teachers will have access to cutting edge subject specific professional development activities, lesson plans and other rich teaching resources. Of further note, the Macglit Literacy Program, and Elementary Maths Mastery Numeracy program go from strength to strength, with thanks to Rhonda North and her gifted team.

- The enactment of the College's Master Plan continues at pace with further updates to follow in future newsletter editions from our Principal, Carmel Barker, and Business Manager, Leonie McGuckian.
- And through the lens of Courage in 2023, the school community is exploring the themes of Justice and Peace in our community and world. The work of the Justice and Democracy Group is rightly celebrated in this week's newsletter, with Tanya Waterson and her student activists providing a timely reminder to us all of the importance of making fair trade purchases this Easter. The voice of students in this crucial space is a key ingredient in our change journey. Further to this and of equal importance is the work and learnings of the College's staff

around the Kildare Ministries Values, Vision and Mission. Following a successful series of professional learning activities, these principles are at the forefront of our staff's thinking, as we encourage staff to create authentic opportunities for integration into curriculum. I encourage you to explore such policies as the Kildare Ministries Modern Slavery Policy, to engage with the content and seek meaningful outlets for the principles wherever possible in your everyday lives. https://www.kildareministries.org.au/ kildare-ministries-policies.

A positive, inclusive culture of learning is critical to building on existing successes at Marian College. Our teachers are challenged to develop strong and comprehensive pedagogies, and research and evidence-based knowledge. Our leaders, are being nurtured to adopt mindsets of transformation, growth, innovation, empowerment and partnership.
