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From the Principal's Office



Dear Parents, Carers, Friends and Students of Marian College,

It has been an incredible eighteen month roller-coaster ride for all schools as we navigate the demands of COVID lockdowns, remote learning, and physical separations from our communities. I am so proud of the efforts of our staff, students and parents at Marian College. We each play a part in ensuring the community remains safe and well. The highlight of the week was to see our Year 12 students and Year 11 Unit 4 students return to school on Friday. It has been difficult for all students but to then navigate assessment and final revisions just prior to the external exams adds another level of stress. Thank you to the teachers and other staff onsite supporting the students, and to the many staff members still working hard from home.

Winston Churchill's poignant remark to 'Never let a good crisis go to waste', is as relevant today during the pandemic as it was for the War generation. Much of what we do as leaders, teachers or parents today is about Hope. The Sisters have taught us well about the positives and beauty in our world, and about change, without necessarily knowing what the path ahead may hold for us.

Term Break this Friday.

As we come to the final week of the third term and end of the winter months, it is normal that students will be feeling a little fatigued. The holidays are a time to refresh and find something outside the studies, assessment and routines of school. I know for the seniors, this is a balance between preparation for the final few weeks of exams and finding some time for yourself. For other students, it is about finding what gives you joy over the break.

General Achievement Test (GAT)

Seniors return on Monday the 4th October. We should receive notice some time over the second week of the break about the return of all other students. Day 2 (5th October) is the General Achievement Test (GAT) for all Unit 4 VCE students. This will be conducted in our school gymnasium.

Australian Psychologist, Michael Carr-Greggs, provides tips to help all generations navigate the impact of COVID-19, but especially the young. He suggests, "With respect to more family time, at a time when most young people are spreading their psychological wings, being away from friends and in some cases stuck at home can be difficult. What can adults do to maintain relationships? The key actions are to be understanding, acknowledge how hard things must be and offer support. Using humour, trying to resolve conflicts quickly and doing a daily emotional check-in with regular family meetings - may help diffuse tensions" (michaelcarrgregg.com).

Update Covid Restrictions - Friday 10th September

Early next term we are hoping for a greater easing of restrictions to include the usual end of year celebrations in one form or another. We are looking at alternative plans at the moment to ensure we keep all students and the community safe. The following points are the latest update from Catholic Education Victoria based on government advice.

- **All inter-school activities** should be deferred or held remotely.
- **Visitors are restricted to essential visitors only such as for health and wellbeing.**
- **School events, gatherings and assemblies** and non-essential meetings should be deferred or held remotely.
- **Physical education and intra-school sport** – Outdoor and indoor contact and non-contact physical activity is permitted **in regional Victoria (excluding Greater Shepparton LGA)**. When using an external sporting facility in regional Victoria, density limits do not apply where there is exclusive use of the venue by single schools, however schools should continue to apply COVIDSafe principles to decision making, including avoiding interactions in closed spaces and physical distancing where practicable.
- **Camps and excursions** cannot take place at this time.

Term break will begin at 12.45 this Friday for all students in remote learning. For students onsite we have planned activities from lunchtime until 2.15, when all students are dismissed. I wish all students and families a wonderful and safe holiday break.



But on the 16th of December Angel Indianna Gibson Thompson was born, or ripped from my mother (as she likes to describe it).

After coming into this world a few weeks early I was a scared baby who clung to my Mum and Dad and never let go. The first 6 months of my life were spent in my home town of Aviemore, Scotland. I was the youngest of four so obviously the favorite, coming just 18 months after my big sister Brook, who was forced to start walking and carry all her things by herself once I was born. Ten years separated me and my biggest sister Yasmin, then five years for my brother Tyler.

So six months passed with my Mum's family when my Dad got homesick so we decided to leave for Australia, and my family, being the people we are, took the scenic route through America. So there were 4 kids, a great big handful. When in America we went to all the famous climbing areas, but I must say the highlight was Disney World, even though the memories are mere photographs.

We lived at Cape Otway Light Station on the Great Ocean Road for the first 4 years of my life in Australia and it was amazing. My parents managed the tourist attraction so we were always on display and loved it. We had a whole team of staff looking after us and a fully stocked cafe with a beautiful Greek lady Toulia (who became our adopted grandmother), so whenever we were hungry my sister and I were stuffing our faces with cakes and scones. After living somewhat isolated at the Cape we decided it was time to move to Apollo Bay.

In town we moved into our big beautiful beach house on Holzer Drive. Being in the Bay meant



it was time to get a dog, so we set off on our journey to look for the best pet. We came across a scared little runt who was so excited to meet us he ran into the glass door at his farm. So Morlich (named after a Scottish loch in Aviemore and pronounced like more-lick) came home and is the best trained but also the most adventurous dog I've ever met. At the age of 6 I was finally starting at Apollo Bay P-12 College with my best friends Tori and Mya. The bay was the best place to grow up. I went from Under 8s all the way to SRC through the surf life saving club and participated in all the surf rescue carnivals. At the age of 5 I started dancing at MSOD in Colac, and I've been dancing ever since.

In Grade 5 I was extremely lucky to go back to Scotland to see my friends and family. Over there my sister Brook and I attended Aviemore Primary School for one month. It was an amazing experience and I'm grateful I had that opportunity.

In the middle of 2018 my Dad moved to Emerald in Queensland and being the spontaneous soul I am, I decided to move schools once again to live with him. I joined the school production and also started at my 3rd dance school EAOD where I met one of my best friends Katriana who I am still very close with. Emerald was a beautiful town and I'm so glad I made the choice to move there with my dad.

At the end of Year 9 I decided to move back home with Mum in Halls Gap and attend Marian College (due to covid life would have been easier up there), here I have started back at dance and also been involved in the school productions. The community and school network here at Marian has made it my favourite school I've been to. Upon leaving Year 12 I would like to attend The University of Edinburgh to study social anthropology and archaeology, but because of restrictions I don't know how easy that will be so I might take a gap year.

So that's me, well me from my point of view. I would like to thank all the teachers, mentors and coaches I've had along the way who helped grow and shape me into the person I am today. I will thank and be forever grateful for the friends I've made, who are by my side or far away. To the Year 12s just remember what Dr. Seuss once said:


My Kitchen Hamper - Year 10





Humanitarian STEM jobs making a major impact

When we think of humanitarian and social impact careers, we often think of legal aid, education and social work-type gigs. Cassie Steel from Careers with STEM, has identified 3 science, tech and engineering jobs making a massive impact on others. These include:

Epidemiologist

These guys spend their time focussing on diseases – how they're caused and spread, but also how they can be contained and prevented – in vulnerable communities. Disaster relief teams rely on epidemiologists to investigate outbreaks (think: COVID-19 or meningitis and cholera in an over-populated refugee camp), which often involves managing large-scale studies and mining massive data sets to support health campaigns and programs.



Geographic Information Systems Analyst

Experts in geographic information systems use their navigation, map-making and data processing skills to assist when disasters – like earthquakes, floods and human conflicts – strike. They create maps to assist in-situ field workers access hard-to-reach places, as well as process geographic data to predict, prevent and improve response time for future scenarios.

Agronomist

Agronomists traditionally study plants, animals, soil and cultivation techniques to improve the productivity and sustainability of farms and agricultural industries, yet act as key specialists on food security when extreme climates or conflict hit. The agricultural scientists re-assess the use of effected farmlands in struggling environments and offer solutions on reducing famine and maintaining a steady crop supply.
