although it was hard it was good for me to focus on other things and one of those was farming which I now love just as much.

I relish living on our farm as it gives you the freedom to just go out and there will always be something to do. As we are a smaller operation compared to other people in the district, I work for Dad's cousins over harvest and their big gear always keeps me on my toes but I love the long hours and the satisfaction of looking back and seeing the progress that's been made. Farming or a job in the agricultural industry is definitely something that I see myself doing in the future.




IN MY WORDS *with Mikayla Walker*



New early entry program – ACU Guarantee

Launching this year is the ACU Guarantee program, which will allow Year 12 students to gain entry to ACU based on their Year 11 results.

Opening in August for 2021 applications, the ACU Guarantee program will see offers made as early as September – although students must still complete their Year 12 exams to qualify.

Students can also apply for additional adjustment factors by submitting up to three statements outlining personal circumstances and their motivation for university study.
