We arrive at the term holiday all somewhat disorientated as the usual College Easter celebrations and 'Way of the Cross' are postponed for more urgent matters. We are conscious of the very real concern within our community as companies and small businesses close their doors, and the flow-on emotional and financial effect this is having on families. We further understand that the prompt closure of all Victorian schools added a further level of anxiety and stress for many of our students and

families. Despite the Student Free Day on Monday, the response from all parents and students has been nothing short of incredible, and I thank you sincerely for your quick action in collecting books, computers, iPads and other resources to support the transition to online learning.

Talking to staff yesterday, I spoke about the collective power we have as a community with more than 550 people onsite every day. We are 'more powerful than we can imagine'. In the words of Mother Teresa, 'Not all of us can do great things but we can do small things with love'. There will be a time when together we find creative ways to help rebuild and support the broader local communities experiencing the brunt of the virus at this time. It is our intention as a staff to explore creative ideas together to help once school life returns.

While the school closure emerged more quickly than anyone anticipated, please be assured we are in a very good place with comprehensive planning across all areas of the College. The staff have been brilliant, and will continue to work to ensure all students are catered for well during this period.

Later today, I will forward one final letter for the term on the Coronavirus. This will include key contact details and processes to suitable response to any of your concerns over the weeks ahead. I have asked staff to take a break and to find something positive, relaxing and enjoyable to do over the holidays. I would encourage all families and students to do the same. I will be in contact with all parents in the second week of the holidays, and just before Easter, to update you on the schools situation. Go with *Strength and Gentleness*.

It was also weird being in a small-town primary school because I was so used to schools

being big and crowded; it was a nice change. I met two of my best friends that year, Sophie McKenzie and Josh O'Donohue. Moving from primary school to high school was another big change, but more exciting than ever! From that point on, I made more and more friends and I love them all!

The biggest highlight for me so far was about five years ago when my mum met a pretty cool dude named Ryan and his son Noah, even though the footy team they barrack for (Geelong Cats) aren't so great. Finally, thank you to my best friends Ella, Daina, Grace, Liam, and my sister Nisha for being there to help and support me through my struggles, and thank you to my other good friends (they know who they are), for making me laugh and smile every day. I'd also like to thank them for helping me get this far, and my parents of course!


# IN MY WORDS *with Tyler Wineberg*

In 2014 I did Grade Six at St Patrick's in Stawell, where I met the likes of Joseph Kingston and Hayley Little. I remember how hard it was to get to know people in one year and to try to forge a new reputation.



Although, thankfully now I have seemed to have survived that.

In Year 9 I also made a decision that changed my life. I was offered by the Vic Country Wimmera to trial for the V-Line Cup, but chose to play 'Audrey 2' in "Little Shop of Horrors" and have gone on to play 'The Preacher' in "Bonnie and Clyde" and 'Courfeyrac' in "Les Miserables".

To my fellow Year 12's, grab this year around the neck and don't let go.

As for my future, I'm looking into Secondary School teaching (who would want to go back to school after they have finished school?).
